Youth Waterfowl Day(s) ⁶	States may select 2 days in each duck hunting zone as Youth Waterfowl Days in addition to their regular duck season. The day(s) must be held outside any regular duck season on a weekend, holidays, or other non-school days when youth hunters would have the maximum opportunity to participate. The day(s) may be held up to 14 days before or after any regular duck-season frameworks or within the closed portion between season segments, or within any other open season on migratory birds. Youth hunters may not be over the age of 17. In addition, an adult at least 18 years of age must accompany the youth hunter into the field. This adult may not duck hunt but may participate in other seasons that are open on the special youth day. Youth hunters 16 years of age and older must possess a Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (also known as Federal Duck Stamp). The daily bag limits may include ducks, geese, tundra swans, mergansers, coots, moorhens, and gallinules and would be the same as those allowed in the regular season. Tundra swans may only be taken by participants possessing the applicable permit.						
Veterans/Military Waterfowl Day(s) ⁶	States may select 2 days in each duck hunting zone as Veteran/Military Waterfowl Days in addition to their regular duck season. This includes veterans and members of the Armed Forces on active duty, including members of the National Guard and Reserves on active duty (other than for training). The day(s) may be held up to 14 days before or after any regular duck-season frameworks or within the closed portion between season segments, or within any other open season on migratory birds. The days can be held concurrently with Youth Waterfowl Days. Participants must possess a Federal Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamp (also known as Federal Duck Stamp). The daily bag limits may include ducks, geese, tundra swans, mergansers, coots, moorhens, and gallinules and would be the same as those allowed in the regular season. Tundra swans may only be taken by participants possessing the applicable permit.

Notes on Shooting hours and bag limits:

Federal guidelines allow for shooting hours to be ½ hour before sunrise to sunset for all species. However, federal guidelines do allow for shooting hours for Canada geese only during the month of September to extend to ½ hour after sunset. In addition to extended shooting hours, federal guidelines also allow the use of unplugged guns and electronic calls for Canada geese only during the month of September. The extended shooting hours, unplugged guns and electronic calls for Canada geese can occur only in areas that are closed to all other waterfowl hunting. The North Carolina Wildlife Commission may choose to restrict shooting hours, unplugged guns and electronic calls if desired.

Federal guidelines allow for the maximum daily bag limits as listed above. The North Carolina Wildlife Commission has the ability to choose a smaller bag limit if desired.
